The Five Essential

Components of Reading

- Recognizing and using individual sounds to create words, or **phonemic awareness**.
- Understanding the relationship between written letters and spoken sounds, or **phonics**.
- Developing the ability to read a text accurately and quickly, or **reading fluency**.
- Learning the meaning and pronunciation of words, or **vocabulary development**.
- Acquiring strategies to understand, remember and communicate what is read, or **reading comprehension strategies**.



Quick Tips!

- * Take books everywhere (the car, bus, vacation, doctor's office), and make the most of every minute.
- * Read everyday items aloud: food labels, maps, menus, cereal boxes, road signs, catalogs, newspapers and from electronic devices too!
- * Set up a home library. A few books on a special shelf is a great start. And it doesn't have to be expensive!

SIMPLE STRATEGIES FOR CREATING STRONG READERS

Without doubt, reading with children spells success for early literacy. Putting a few simple strategies into action will make a significant difference in helping children develop into good readers and writers. Through reading aloud, providing print material, and promoting positive attitudes about reading and writing, you can have a powerful impact on children's literacy and learning.

Invite a child to read everyday.

Read a child's favorite book over and over again.

Read many stories with rhyming words and lines that repeat. Invite the child to join in on these parts. Point, word by word, as he/she reads along with you.

Read from a variety of children's books, include non fiction, poetry, song books and fairy tales.
